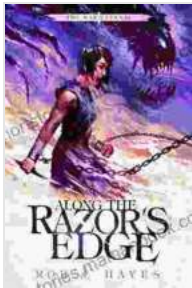


Along The Razor S Edge (The War Eternal 1)
