
Before We Had the Word: Poems by Dana Gioia

One of the central themes of the collection is the idea of the "unsayable." There are some things that we simply cannot express in words, and yet they are no less real for that. Gioia's poems explore the ways in which we can approach these unsayable things, even if we can never fully grasp them.

In "The Unsayable," Gioia writes:

>There are things we cannot say, >Things we cannot even think, >Things that lie beyond the reach >Of language and of thought.

>But we can feel them, >We can sense them, >We can know them >In the depths of our being.

Gioia's poems are a testament to the power of language, even when it is limited. They show us that words can help us to understand the world around us, but they can also lead us to a deeper understanding of ourselves.
