- What lesson can we learn from this story?

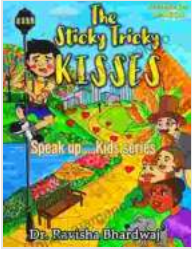
The story can spark meaningful conversations about personal identity and the importance of embracing one's own unique qualities. Encourage children to share their thoughts and experiences related to the topic.
